Letter from the CEO

Dear friends,

Two years ago, **Allied Scholars for Animal Protection** was just an idea on my whiteboard. Today, I can't help but feel proud of how far we've come. The dedication of our students, supporters, staff, and allies across academia has made this dream a reality.

This year is a testament to our growth and impact. From humble beginnings, we've expanded our reach to 14 chapters across Texas, the Midwest and the Northeast.

Next semester, we're expanding internationally.

All revolutions start in college. As our network grows, so does our influence. In June, our students' efforts at UT Austin led to the establishment of a prominent vegan line in UT Austin's dining halls, a shift that's replacing tens of thousands of nonvegan meals annually.

Meanwhile, at Columbia we're partnering with **Plant-Based Universities** to launch a campaign for 100% plant-based dining halls for the first time in the US. Our hope is that this campaign will be an example for schools across the United States, and that as more schools establish plant-based dining programs, others will feel pressured to follow suit.

Every chapter has conducted impactful outreach events throughout the semester, working to incorporate inactive vegans into the movement while continuously making new vegans. We've also held lectures on the moral urgency of veganism and alternative proteins, motivating students to get active and make an impact with their careers. At several schools, our events have <u>made headlines</u>.:)

It's been a thrill, and next year we're aiming even higher. Our five year goal is to establish ASAP chapters at the top 100 Universities across the US. We need your help to do this. <u>Please donate generously to our mission.</u>






Our achievements

We stopped at the University of Chicago in fall to sell human breast milk and work with students on animal advocacy. We'll be opening a chapter there in spring 2024!








Training the Next Generation of Leaders

This semester, we hosted two talks by Dr. Michael Klaper at Brown University, focused on the health benefits of a plant-based diet and on how healthcare professionals can help transform the food system.

We also hosted a webinar with Dr. Ali Saad on the environmental and public health consequences of animal agriculture, and possible career paths for addressing these problems.








During our visits to each ASAP chapter, we hosted talks by Dr.
Harsini, a biomedical and food system scientist who works on
cultivated meat bioprocessing at the Good Food Institute. Dr.
Harsini's talks covered the moral urgency of veganism, the impacts
of animal agriculture on the environment and public health, and
impactful career paths such as alternative protein research.






Transforming Campus Dining

Transforming campus dining halls is a key pillar of ASAP's impact.


In June, our <u>petition at UT Austin</u> led to the creation of a permanent vegan line for all meals. Dining services also signed up to receive more training on plant-based menus from the Humane Society of the United States.

















A series of posters advertising our **dining hall campaign at Columbia**. Anyone affiliated with Columbia, please sign!

We're suing to Protect Free Speech!

Freedom of speech is critical for our work as animal advocates. Unfortunately, those in power often seek to silence the voices of compassion and truth.

Last year, ASAP CFO Daraius Dubash was <u>illegally arrested for</u> <u>peacefully protesting</u> animal abuse at Discovery Green park in Houston, Texas. With support from the <u>Law & Religion Clinic</u> at the University of Texas and the <u>Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression</u>, we are <u>suing the City of Houston to protect free speech</u>.

What's next?

It's been a big year for ASAP, and with your help, we'll aim even higher in 2024.

Expansion remains a central objective: this Spring, we'll have at least 14 chapters, including a new chapter "across the pond" at the University of Maastricht. By the fall, we're hoping to more than double that number.

We're frequently receiving requests to start new ASAP chapters at universities across the country, and the number of requests is exceeding our capacity to meet them. New staff and increased funding will be critical to growing our movement.

We're also hitting the road again, organizing in-person trainings at each school we visit during the semester. These experiences are designed to empower student leaders with the tools and knowledge they need to drive meaningful change at their schools and across society as they graduate and pursue impactful careers.

Meanwhile, we're going to continue transforming campus dining through student-led campaigns, including a campaign at Columbia for 100% plant-based dining.

This summer, we'll be systematizing our leadership program via a training seminar for our Chapter Directors, providing a platform for students to sharpen their skills and broaden their knowledge of animal advocacy.

We hope you enjoyed our 2023 review. Your support is crucial to our continued success, and we hope you'll join us in fighting for the animals next year.
